Foreword

Guru Granth Sahib is the most distinctive scripture in several ways. It claims no exclusiveness, hence does not prescribe any proselytization. It is also distinctive in another sense that it preserves the original compositions of the Sikh Gurus and also embodies spiritual wisdom of over five centuries from the times of Bhagat Jaidev, Baba Sheikh Farid to those of martyrdom of the ninth Guru, Tegh Bahadur.

In his Introduction to the Sacred Writings of the Sikhs first published by UNESCO in 1960, Dr. S. Radhakrishnan, philosopher, President of India, pays rich tribute to the sacred writings contained in Guru Granth Sahib which teach us how to transcend barriers created in the name of caste, religion and territorial boundaries. While emphasising relevance of Guru Granth Sahib in the emerging world order Arnold Toynbee writes:

"Mankind's religious future may be obscure. Yet one thing can be foreseen. The living higher religions are going to influence each other more than ever before in the days of increasing communication between all parts of the world and all branches of the human race. In this coming religious debate, the Sikh religion and its scripture, the Adi Granth, will have something of special value to say to the rest of the world."

We are fortunate that we had the privilege of celebrating quadricentenary of the installation of Guru Granth Sahib in the Golden Temple in 2004. Four years later, in 2008, tercentenary of Gurgaddi Diwas was celebrated at home and abroad. This has been the most significant period in recent Sikh history so far as the Sikh scripture is concerned. A National Level Committee was formed by the Government of India, with the Prime Minister of India, as its Chairman, on this occasion. Lectures, seminars and printing of books in different languages were arranged to spread the essentially unifying message of Guru Granth Sahib.

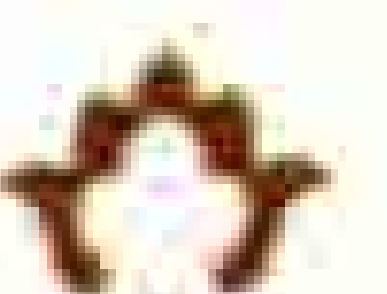
Apart from celebrating functions in Darbar Sahib, Amritsar, and other historic places of the Sikh community, An International Seminar on 'Guru Granth Sahib and its Context' was arranged by Bhai Vir Singh Sahitya Sadan in the Vigyan Bhawan, New Delhi, which was inaugurated by Dr. Manmohan Singh, the Prime Minister of India, in which scholars from all over India and abroad participated. Proceedings of this seminar edited by this writer were published by the Sadan. The National Institute of Panjab Studies took up a major project of locating, photographing and conserving valuable tangible heritage of the Sikhs. Based on fieldwork and research, the Institute published eight pictorial books under the 'Punjab Heritage Series'. The second project, 'Locating, Cataloguing and Digitizing rare Guru Granth Sahib Birs', was taken up by the Institute in connection with the tercentenary celebration of Gurgaddi Diwas. With active support from like-minded institutions and individuals, the Institute has been able to digitize more than 300 rare Guru Granth Sahib Manuscripts. The Institute is now publishing *Shabad Guru: An Illustrated Catalogue of Guru Granth Sahib Manuscripts* in four volumes for which I congratulate Dr. Mohinder Singh and his team for the patience, perseverance and dedication.

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The National Mission for Manuscripts was established by the Ministry of Culture, Government of India, with the purpose of locating, documenting, preserving and disseminating the rich cultural heritage contained in Indian manuscripts. The National Mission for Manuscripts with its mandate to document the manuscripts has directed its attention towards sponsoring programmes for the preparation of descriptive catalogues in various repositories. The Catalogue of rare Guru Granth Sahib Birs is one of such projects sponsored by the National Mission for Manuscripts.

Adi Granth was prepared by Guru Arjan Dev with Bhai Gurdas acting as its amanuensis. Guru Arjan Dev collected hymns, of Guru Nanak Dev and his successors, from Baba Mohan. He also collected selections from the writings of Bhaktas and Saints who were on the same spiritual wavelength as that of Guru Nanak, the founder of the Sikh faith. Upon compilation of the scripture, it was installed in Harimandir Sahib, popularly known as the Golden Temple. Upon tenth Guru declaring the scripture as the Guru Eternal, it came to be popularly known as Guru Granth Sahib.

As printing or any mode of making copies of the scripture was not available in those days, making handwritten copies of the *Bir* was considered, an act of religious merit. Devotees spent months and years copying the Birs for the benefit of the congregation. However, a survey of some of the rare Guru Granth Sahib Birs pertaining to the 17th and 18th centuries shows, that in spite of the Guru's disapproval of the Banno Bir, its copies were being made along-side the Kartapuri Bir. In order to conserve this precious tangible heritage of the Sikh community the National Mission for Manuscripts in collaboration with the National Institute of Panjab Studies sponsored a major project of locating, digitizing and cataloguing rare Guru Granth Sahib Manuscripts in different parts of India.

National Institute of Panjab Studies, which has digitized most of the rare Guru Granth Sahib Birs available in different parts of India, is engaged in publishing a four volume Catalogue of these Manuscripts. Some of the rare Birs even bear the *Nisans* of the Sikh Gurus. The Catalogue carries historical details of all the manuscripts along with photographs of the Mool Mantra and provides details of more than three hundred Guru Granth Sahib Birs written during 17th, 18th and 19th centuries, which are in possession of a number of individuals, families and institutions.

The first volume was published jointly by National Mission for Manuscripts and National Institute of Panjab Studies was presented to the President of India during an International Seminar on Guru Granth Sahib held in Vigyan Bhawan, a couple of years ago. It is a matter of satisfaction that the National Mission for Manuscripts and National Institute of Panjab Studies are now publishing the remaining three volumes. I am sure publication of these Catalogues will create further interest in discovering the universal relevance of Guru Nanak's philosophy that binds people together with the cement of human consciousness.

Introduction

While the Adi Granth was prepared by Guru Arjan Dev with Bhai Gurdas acting as its amanuensis, its origins can be traced to the days of Guru Nanak Dev. According to the popular accounts, upon his enlightenment after emergence from the rivulet Kali Bein, Guru Nanak Dev recited Mool Mantra, the primal creed of the Sikh religion. From the Puratan Janamsakhi we learn that during his odysseys Guru Nanak Dev got some of his companions enroute to scribe the hymns that he composed. Thus some of his devotees acted as scribes for recording the hymns. We learn that Majh ki Var and Sidh Gosht were scribed by Bhai Saido Gheeho, while Malar ki Var was scribed by Guru's devotees Hassu and Shihaan. However, a systematic effort to locate, edit and include the hymns of the Gurus and other Bhaktas and Saints in one volume was made by Guru Arjan Dev, which came to be popularly known as Pothi (Sahib) and later (Adi) Granth. It came to be revered as Guru Granth Sahib upon its being declared the Guru Eternal by Guru Gobind Singh.

To emphasise the unity of humankind, Guru Nanak Dev laid great stress on reverence for *Shabad* which is manifestation of the Divine. Guru Nanak Dev composed Japji which describes the primal creed of the Sikh faith. At a time when the Indian society was divided because of barriers created in the name of caste and religion, Guru Nanak Dev gave a new message of hope by emphasising on the transcendental vision of the Ultimate. During his dialogue with the Sidhas he was asked, "Who is thy Guru, who thou art the follower?", the Guru replied, "The Word is the Guru and the mind (attuned to the Word) disciple". He described *Shabad* (Word) as revealed to him as the source which could unite the humanity. While *Shabad* has been defined in different traditions in different ways, in Sikh parlance it means Divine Word, revealed through hymns set to musical modes especially composed by the Gurus.

Growing popularity of the Sikh faith and gradual increase in the number of its followers led to the rival claimants to Guruship writing under the pen-name of Nanak and making all out efforts to popularize them. Therefore, it became important for Guru Arjan Dev to codify the genuine hymns and present them to the community of followers in an authenticated and authorized form. Since the *bani* of Guru Nanak Dev and his predecessors was available in the collection of Baba Mohan, popularly known as Mohan Pothian, Guru Arjan Dev sent Bhai Gurdas to obtain this collection for the Guru. However, Baba Mohan did not part with the pothis. Baba Buddha was therefore sent on the same mission, but the result was not different. Thereafter, Guru Arjan Dev himself went to Baba Mohan's house. While Baba Mohan was sitting in the attic of his house in Goindwal, the Guru sang melodious hymns from the ground floor. The humility of the Guru greatly moved Baba Mohan who happily agreed to pass the Pothis on to him.

Guru Arjan Dev also collected selections from the writings of Hindu and Muslim saints who were at the same spiritual wavelength as the Sikh Gurus. In this process, he was able to obtain hymns of Kabir, Farid, Namdev, Ravidas and Bhikhan and other saints, some of whom belonged to the so-called low castes.

To work on the volume, the Guru selected a serene spot in Ramsar, near Amritsar, and erected a tent which became his makeshift study for working on the Volume. When the Volume was completed, with Bhai Gurdas as its amanuensis, the Guru asked one of his devotees, Bhai Banno, to carry it to Lahore for binding. During the process of binding Bhai Banno is believed to have made a copy of the scripture which came to be known as Banno Bir. The original Bir, which remained in the possession of Sodhi descendants of Dhir Mal settled at Kartarpur (near Jalandhar in Panjab), came to be known as the Kartarpuri Bir.

The bound volume of the original *Bir* was taken from Ramsar to the newly built Harimandir Sahib in a procession with due respect and ceremonies befitting the installation. While Baba Buddha respectfully carried the Volume on his head, Guru Arjan Dev walked behind with a flywhisk as a mark of respect. They all marched barefoot and installed the Volume in the sanctum sanctorum of the Harimandir Sahib in August 1604.

Since printing or any other mode of making copies of the scripture was not available in those days, making handwritten copies of the *Bir* was considered an act of religious merit. Devotees spent months and years copying the Birs for the benefit of the congregation. However, a survey of some of the rare Guru Granth Sahib Birs pertaining to the 17th and 18th centuries shows that in spite of the Guru's disapproval of the Banno Bir, its copies were being made along-side those of the Kartarpuri Bir. As the Sodhis of Kartarpur refused to part with the original Volume called Kartarpuri Bir, Guru Gobind Singh, the tenth Guru, got another *Bir* prepared with Bhai Mani Singh as its amanuensis. As this was prepared at a place called Damdama it came to be popularly known as the Damdami Bir. Apart from the contents of Kartarpuri Bir, this Volume also included hymns of Guru Tegh Bahadur. Baba Deep Singh is believed to have prepared five copies of this Granth which were installed at what are now known as Panj Takhats, five seats of temporal authority of the Sikhs. It is this version of the Granth that provides the authentic text of the printed Guru Granth Sahib and consists of 1430 standard pages in addition to the index generally printed in one Volume by the Shiromani Gurdwara Parbandhak Committee, Amritsar. Before leaving for his heavenly abode in 1708 A.D. Guru Gobind Singh declared Granth Sahib as the Guru Eternal for the Sikhs.

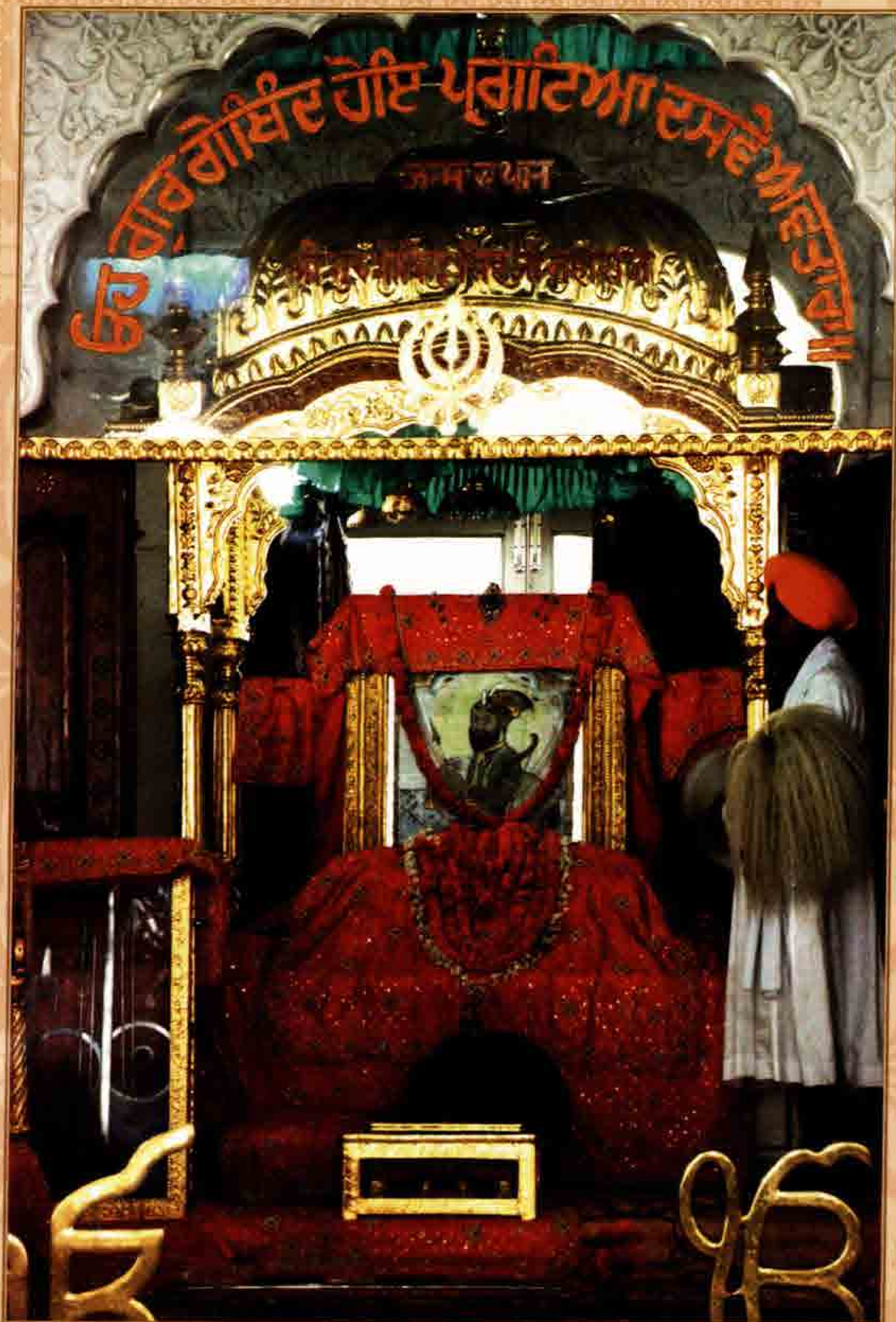
As far as Guru Granth Sahib manuscripts are concerned, it has been an established practice of the scribes to compare their copies with the original Kartarpuri Bir, popularly called Vadda Granth (Big Book). It was believed that a Granth compared and corrected with the Vadda Granth becomes shudh (correct and acceptable). Those who did not have access to the original Granth in Kartarpur did so by comparing their copies with any other reliable copy of the Book. Different hand-written copies of the Guru Granth Sahib came to be associated with the

names of their scribes or places where they were prepared. Thus, apart from Kartarpuri, Banno and Damdami *Bir*, we also have Bahawalwali Bir, Lahori Bir, Pushkar *Bir* and the *Bir* associated with Jagna Brahman, who is mentioned by Bhai Gurdas among prominent Sikhs who died fighting for Guru Hargobind in the battle of Amritsar. In his latest book, "*A Study of Guru Granth Sahib : Doctrine, Social Content, History, Structure and Status*", Prof. J. S. Grewal mentions about some rare Guru Granth Sahib Birs which pre-date the Kartarpuri *Bir* installed at the Harimandir Sahib, Amritsar, in 1604.

With the passage of time, hundreds of handwritten copies of the Guru Granth Sahib were prepared for installation in the Gurdwaras in different parts of India. With the rise of Sikhs to political power and establishment of Maharaja Ranjit Singh's rule in Punjab and patronage of eminent Pahari and Kashmiri artists and scribes, some of the most beautifully illustrated copies of the Guru Granth Sahib were created. We find many illuminated Birs with Islamic and Hindu influences available in different repositories. The Akal Takhat Sahib, Takhat Sri Kesgarh Sahib, Takhat Damdama Sahib, Takhat Patna Sahib, Takhat Sri Hazur Sahib, the Guru Nanak Dev University, the Punjabi University, Patiala, the National Museum, New Delhi, the Chief Khalsa Diwan, Amritsar, Bhai Vir Singh Sahitya Sadan, New Delhi, and some private families have a number of illuminated copies of Guru Granth Sahib manuscripts in their collections. The British Library, London, is also a rich repository of rare Guru Granth Sahib manuscripts including copy of the Kartarpuri *Bir* transcribed by Sodhi Sadhu Singh for presentation to Queen Victoria. The catalogues of Dr. J. F. Blumhardt and Dr. C. Shackle, also mention about some very valuable Guru Granth Sahib Birs in U.K.

While a large number of Guru Granth Sahib manuscripts, including some very rare ones such as the Kartarpuri *Bir* prepared under the direct supervision of Guru Arjan Dev, the Damdami *Bir* prepared under the direct supervision of Guru Gobind Singh and other copies with Mool Mantra inscribed in the hands of the Gurus are available, no comprehensive catalogue or any such account of the Guru Granth Sahib manuscripts was prepared and kept under the control of Akal Takhat or any other central Sikh authority. As a result, with the passage of time some of the rare Guru Granth Sahib Birs have either changed hands or simply disappeared. No one knows the fate of the first five copies of the Damdami *Bir* prepared by Baba Deep Singh and sent to different Takhts. Similarly one does not know for sure which is the Guru Granth manuscript, that was bestowed Guruship by Guru Gobind Singh before his death at Hazur Sahib, Nanded, in 1708 A.D.

While it is difficult to guess the exact number of Guru Granth Sahib manuscripts presently available whether copied from Kartarpuri, Banno or Damdami Birs, there are scholars who have tried to locate them and have worked on different Birs available with different institutions and individuals. A careful study of the works of these scholars shows that many of the rare manuscripts quoted in G. B. Singh's *Sri Guru Granth Sahib Dian Prachin Biran*, published in 1944, are not traceable. With a view to creating awareness for the conservation of this precious tangible heritage of the Sikh community, the National Institute of Panjab Studies took up a major

project of "Locating, Cataloguing and Digitizing rare Guru Granth Sahib Manuscripts" in different parts of India and abroad. In the course of our fieldwork we have been able to locate and catalogue nearly three hundred rare Guru Granth Sahib Birs out of which more than two hundred have already been digitised in collaboration with Professor Sahib Singh Trust for which we record our obligation to Prof. Manjit Singh and other trustees. In order to share the benefit of our field work with interested scholars we have decided to bring out "*Shabad Guru: Illustrated Catalogue of Rare Guru Granth Sahib Manuscripts*" in four volumes giving basic information about rare Guru Granth Sahib manuscripts at home and abroad. This Catalogue carries historical details of available Guru Granth Sahib manuscripts along with reproduction of the Mool Mantra and some pages of the manuscripts providing rare glimpses of sacred heritage of the Sikh community.

For the field work and publication of the catalogue we got financial support from the National Mission for Manuscripts and the Delhi Sikh Gurdwara Management Committee, New Delhi, which we gratefully acknowledge. We also wish to acknowledge the cooperation we received from the Shiromani Gurdwara Prabandhak Committee; Chief Khalsa Diwan; Guru Nanak Dev University, Amritsar; Punjabi University, Patiala; Panjab University, Chandigarh; Takhat Sri Harmandir Sahib, Patna; Takhat Sri Hazur Sahib, Nanded; Panjab Languages Department, Patiala; Panjab State Archives, Chandigarh and Bhai Vir Singh Sahitya Sadan, New Delhi and other institutions and individuals who allowed us access to their collections.

We wish to record our gratitude to Dr.J.S.Neki, who has been a source of encouragement and support in the planning and execution of this project; to friends in different parts of India and abroad and to Dr.Navneet Kaur, Raghbir Singh, Deepak Sachdev and other colleagues in the Institute and the Sadan for their inputs to the project.

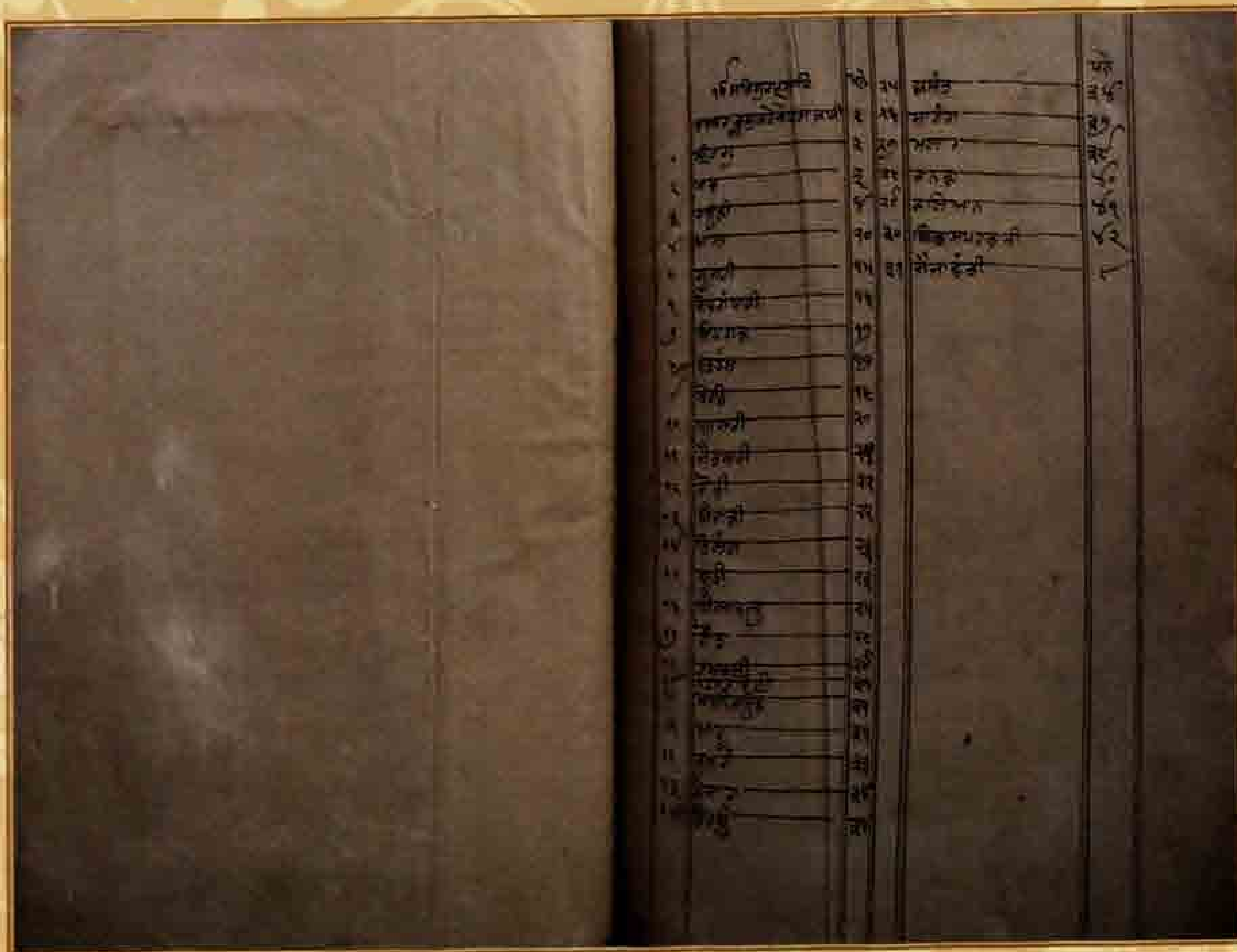

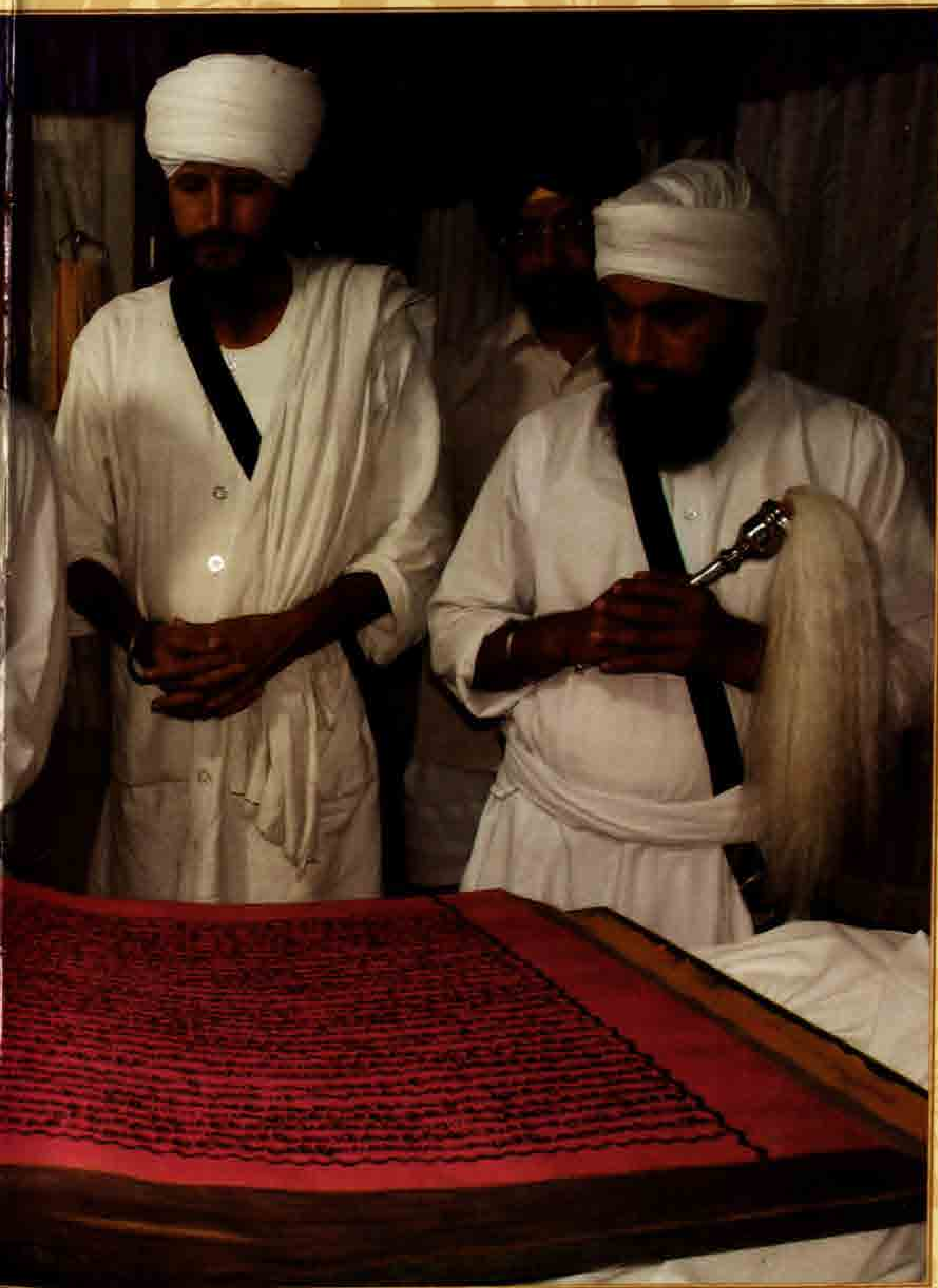


A panoramic view of Gurdwara Langar Sahib, Nanded.

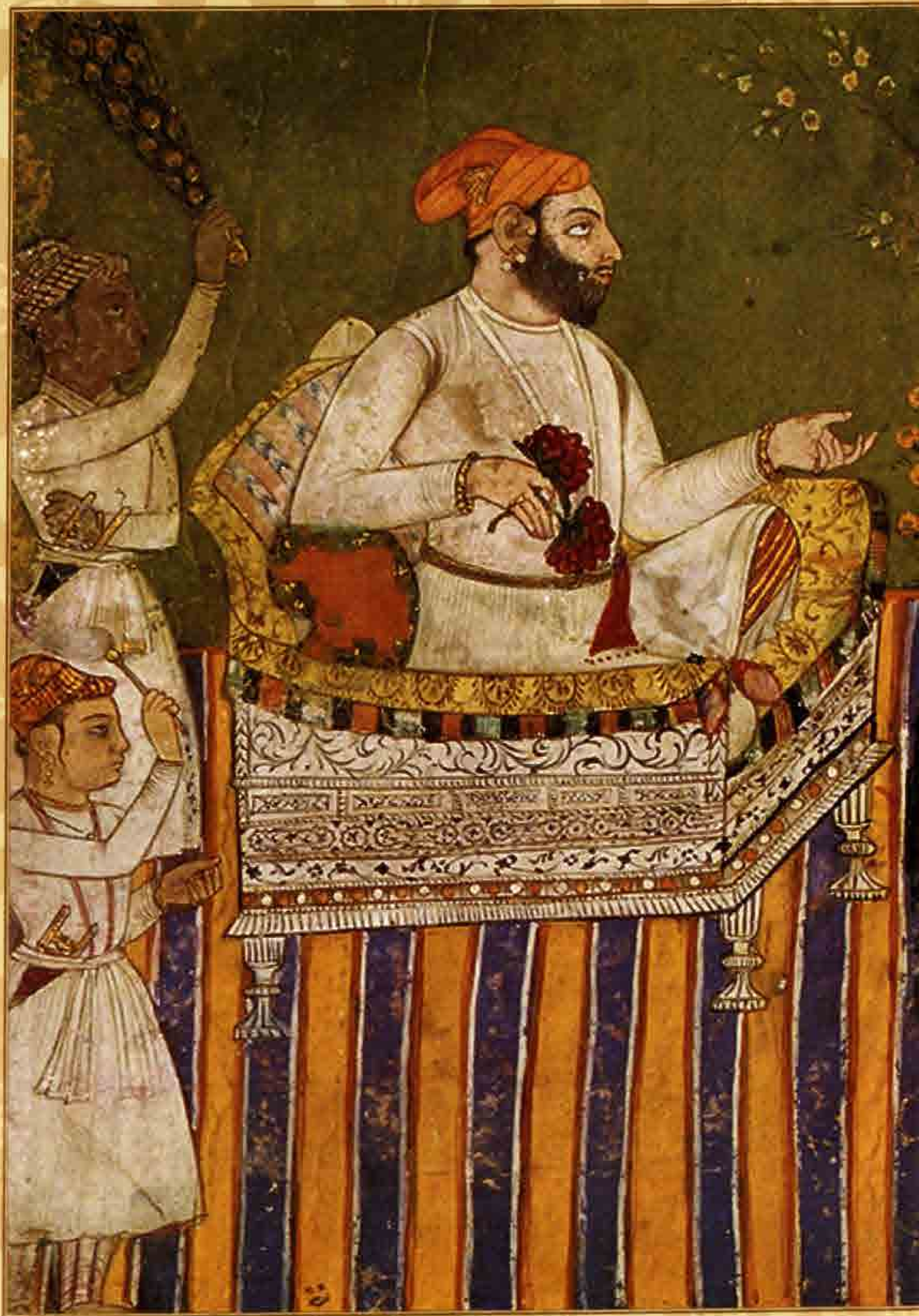

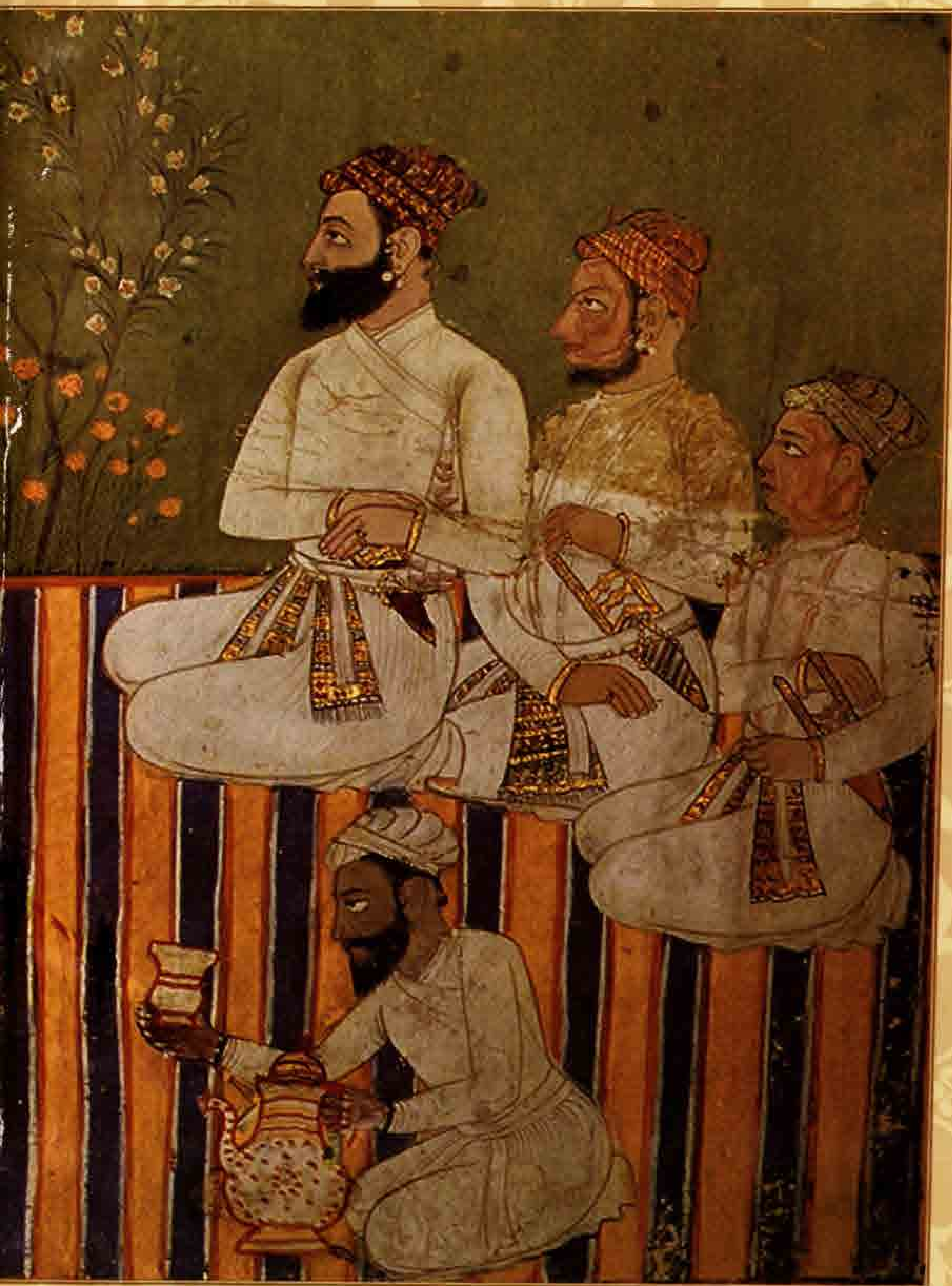

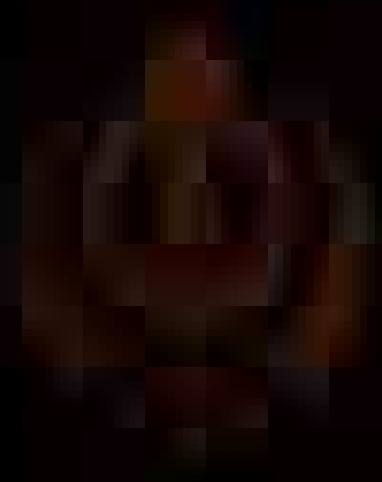
